While it is generally accepted that the comfort and happiness of learners in the classroom is significant, critics of humanistic approaches have suggested (sometimes forcefully) that a focus on these sorts of factors diverts attention from the purpose of a language-learning classroom which is, naturally, to help people to speak, write, read and listen effectively in a foreign language.

Key Concepts: Humanism, a paradigm that emerged in the 1960s, focuses on the human freedom, dignity, and potential. A central assumption of humanism, according to Huit (2001), is that people act with intentionality and values [1]. This is in contrast to the behaviorist notion of operant conditioning (which argues that all behavior is the result of the application of consequences) and the cognitive psychologist belief that the discovering knowledge or constructing meaning is central to learning.
